Regiments which are allowed to wear any Royal Devices, or ancient Badges, on whose Colours the Rank of the Regiment is to be painted towards the upper Corner The size of the Colours, and the length of the Pike, to be the same as those of the Royal Regiments of Foot Guards The Cords and Tassels of all Colours to be crimson and gold mixed
